


DALA NASSER ADONIS RIVER



In the fall of 2023, the Renaissance Society presents the first institutional solo exhibition of Beirut- and Londonbased artist Dala Nasser, featuring a new site-specific commission that responds to the expansive height and volume of the Ren's exhibition space.

As an artist working through abstraction and alternative forms of image-making, Nasser applies an interdisciplinary approach through painting, performance, and film. Her indexical paintings of land, made through direct contact on location. stand in opposition to the sweeping vistas offered by traditional landscape painting. In contrast, Nasser's canvases provide close-up views of the markings of political and environmental erosion and toxicity. Finding meaning in materials and physical processes, Nasser's works examine the deteriorating ecological, historical, and political conditions that result from practices of capitalist and colonial extraction. In a growing body of work that foregrounds the entanglement of human and non-human, she takes the non-human as witness to ecologies of slow violence, colonial theft, and infrastructural failure in times and places where human language has been rendered insufficient or out of reach.

Nasser's project at the Ren centers on the Adonis River (known in modernday Lebanon as the Abraham River) where the mythical Adonis, the mortal lover of the Goddess Aphrodite, was killed by a wild boar. To this day, the myths surrounding this river are commemorated in pilgrimages of mourning and grief. Nasser made the paintings for the exhibition inside the cave where Adonis was killed, on fabrics dyed with iron oxide-rich local clay and washed in the river's water. Rather than hanging on walls, these works are configured into three-dimensional spatial environments that evoke the cave and its surroundings, as well as a temple to Adonis.

W.J.T. MITCHELL AND DALA NASSER

For this virtual program, W.J.T. Mitchell, a leading scholar and theorist of media, visual art, and literature at the University of Chicago, offers his reflections on Dala Nasser's exhibition at the Ren before joining the artist in conversation. Known especially for his work on the relations of visual and verbal representations in the context of social and political issues, Mitchell is the author or editor of many books, including *Landscape and Power* (1994), which Nasser describes as a lasting resource as she thinks about her work.

MYRIAM BEN SALAH AND KIERSTEN NEUMANN

This shared event between the Ren and the University of Chicago's Institute for the Study of Ancient Cultures will put Dala Nasser's exhibition into conversation with the ISAC Museum's ancient Mesopotamian collections, generating new insights into each by exploring such topics as mythological conceptions and practices related to natural materials and intercultural aspects of divinity. Visitors will be led through Nasser's exhibition by Myriam Ben Salah before walking across the University's quad to the ISAC Museum where Kiersten Neumann will present a brief lecture followed by an informal tour and reception in the museum galleries.

Intermissions launched in January 2017 as a programming series devoted to performance and other inventive time-based works, all staged in the Renaissance Society's empty gallery in between exhibitions. This recurring platform features two artists every year, supporting live projects of many different forms and durations.

ALEXANDRA PIRICI ENCYCLOPEDIA OF RELATIONS

DEC 13-17, 2023

Alexandra Pirici's performative actions unfold over extended durations of time, rather than being conceived as one-time events. Without a clear beginning or end, her live works featuring small or large groups of performers invite you to come back repeatedly and allow for continually changing encounters. At the Ren, over the span of five days, the Romanian artist presents *Encyclopedia*

of Relations, in which six performers continuously reconfigure themselves into various forms and structures while using movement, sound, and language.

As Pirici describes it, this work "embodies interactions between humans, humans and other life-forms, humans and technology; between other animals, between plants, between rocks and waves, between voices, between seemingly distinct cultural elements, between melodic lines, between bodies in space. In its combinatory logic, it takes inspiration from both biological reality and the fantastic." First staged at the 59th Venice Biennale in 2022, within the main exhibition, this work takes a new shape at the Ren as the performers adapt to their surroundings and continue their ongoing catalogue of collective relations.

MARJA AHTI

SAT, OCT 21, 8PM IDA NOYES HALL, 3RD FLOOR THEATER 1212 E 59TH ST

A musician and composer born in Sweden and now based in Finland, Marja Ahti has been a stalwart of the Finnish experimental music scene for more than a decade, working primarily with field recordings, synthesizers, electronic feedback, and digital processing. Her work is rooted in an abiding fascination with the "simple strangeness" of human experiences with sound, and human consciousness more broadly—the notion that vibrations sensed by eardrums can

be experienced as something deeply affecting, even profound, under the right conditions. The resulting compositions create vivid, immersive electroacoustic environments, precise and rich in detail, characterized by slowly warping harmonies and mutating textures.

LAUREL HALO

Laurel Halo is a composer, producer, musician, and DJ currently based in Los Angeles. Drawing from a range of music lineages, her considered approach has enabled her to maintain a signature aesthetic across a stylistically diverse output, traversing pop, ambient, left-field club, experimental electronica, and film score. Since 2012 she has released a number of albums ranging in genre-fluidity, complexity and scope, including *Quarantine* (2012), *In Situ* (2015),

Raw Silk Uncut Wood (2018), and Possessed: OST (2020). At Bond Chapel, Halo's performance draws from her latest album, Atlas, which will be released in September 2023 on her new imprint, Awe.

Group visits


We are pleased to welcome visits from schools, universities, and other groups, and our library and archives are open to researchers by appointment. Please contact us to arrange a visit.
